1. <u>Benediction</u> by Kent Haruf

An intimate reflection of family as life ends. Seldom does a book capture love, loss, happiness and life with such perfection; raw emotions will pour out.

2. The Orenda by Joseph Boyden

From the Scotiabank Giller Prize-Winning author of *Through Black Spruce* comes a literary masterpiece steeped in the natural beauty and blood-soaked brutality of Canada's formative years.

3. *The Son* by Philipp Meyer

Part epic of Texas, part classic coming-of-age story, part unflinching portrait of the bloody price of power, *The Son* is an utterly transporting novel that maps the legacy of violence in the American West through the lives of the McCulloughs, an ambitious family as resilient and dangerous as the land they claim.

4. *The Spark* by Kristine Barnett

The extraordinary memoir of a mother's love, commitment and nurturing, which allowed her son, originally diagnosed with severe autism, to flourish into a universally recognized genius — and how any parent can help their child find their spark. This book is also a Heather's Pick.

5. An Astronaut's Guide To Life On Earth by Chris Hadfield

As Commander of the International Space Station, Chris Hadfield captivated the world with stunning photos and commentary from space. Now, in his first book, he offers readers extraordinary stories from his life as an astronaut, and shows how to make the impossible a reality. This book is also a Heather's Pick.

6. I Am Malala by Malala Yousafzai

When the Taliban took control of the Swat Valley in Pakistan, one girl spoke out. Malala Yousafzai refused to be silenced and fought for her right to an education. On Tuesday, October 9, 2012, when she was fifteen, she almost paid the ultimate price. She was shot in the head at



point-blank range while riding the bus home from school. Malala's miraculous recovery has taken her on an extraordinary journey. At sixteen, she has become a global symbol of peaceful protest and the youngest nominee ever for the Nobel Peace Prize. This book is also a Heather's Pick.

7. Fangirl by Rainbow Rowell

From the bestselling author of *Eleanor & Park* comes a coming-of-age tale of fan fiction, family and first love.

8. The Goldfinch by Donna Tartt

A novel of shocking narrative energy and power, *The Goldfinch* combines unforgettably vivid characters, mesmerizing language, and breathtaking suspense, while plumbing with a philosopher's calm the deepest mysteries of love, identity, and art.

9. Thank You For Your Service by David Finkel

More than a work of journalism, Thank You for Your Service is an act of understanding -- shocking but always riveting, unflinching but deeply humane, it takes us inside the heads of those who must live the rest of their lives with the realities of war.

10. Five Days At Memorial by Sheri Fink

Pulitzer Prize winner Sheri Fink's landmark investigation of patient deaths at a New Orleans hospital ravaged by Hurricane Katrina - and her suspenseful portrayal of the quest for truth and justice.

11. The Rosie Project by Graeme Simsion

The feel-good hit of 2013, *The Rosie Project* is a classic screwball romance about a handsome but awkward genetics professor and the woman who is totally wrong for him.

12. The Reason I Jump by Naoki Higashida

A story never before told and a memoir to help change our understanding of the world around us, 13-year-old Naoki Higashida''s astonishing, empathetic book takes us into the mind of a boy with severe autism.

13. *The Dinner* by Herman Koch

An internationally bestselling phenomenon: the darkly suspenseful, highly controversial tale of two families struggling to make the hardest decision of their lives – all over the course of one meal.
